Public Safety Statement:

The Langston University Police Department is dedicated to the enhancement of the opportunity for students, faculty, and staff to participate in the educational experience by providing a safe, protected, and orderly environment. The Langston University Police Department offers a variety of police functions and tasks, which includes campus patrols, criminal investigations, crime prevention, facility security, event security, event planning, and parking management and enforcement.

Members of the Langston University Police Department serve on university and community committees, provide training and specialized presentations to campus organizations, campus-housing groups, and also participate in the design and installation of safety and traffic devices. The professional men and women who make-up the Langston University Police Department are carefully selected to serve as campus law enforcement officers to meet the high standards and the mission of the Campus Police Department.

The Langston University Police Department is staffed 24 hours a day, 365 days annually by at least two (2) full-time officers on duty. The police staff currently includes Eight (8) Certified Peace Officers that are sworn to enforce federal, state, and local laws upon the campus.

The members of the Langston University Police Department are committed to the task of providing a positive image to visitors and members of the campus community no matter what the task may be from providing directions, parking information, or just being friendly with a welcoming smile. As members of the Langston University Police Department we strive to perform our duties in a caring, and professional manner, which promote a friendly community atmosphere.

This includes the use of alternatives to arrests when reasonable and full cooperation is achieved with the various administrative services and functions that are in place to address student conduct. Our enforcement efforts are always focused towards providing a safe and orderly campus community. We encourage students and faculty/staff members to participate in our efforts to provide safety upon campus. The department is willing to share statistics, insights, and experiences for class reports or even vocational interests.

The Langston University Police Department is committed to the task of managing security issues identified on campus by seeking proactive means to avoid problems and situations, suggesting added security measures, providing insight on planning the various activities upon campus or using investigative analysis to assign a deterrent method.

Our participation in athletic and special events includes staging, and planning that insures that all aspects of the event consider the safety and security of all participants. The Langston University Police Department provides professional crowd control and traffic regulations before, during and after each event.

Langston University Police officers are first responders to all emergency situations upon campus. The Langston University Police Department staff has placed "service" as a priority, thereby displaying their extraordinary actions in the line of duty to exemplify this standard of job performance.

CRIME:

It is an unfortunate fact that criminal incidents of all types occur on university campuses. Therefore most universities investigate and make public records of the nature and quantity of each incident classified as a criminal act that occurred on their campuses.

REPORTING CRIMES:

At Langston University crime victims, regardless of how seemingly insignificant the crime, are encouraged to promptly report the incident to the Langston University Police department or to any appropriate police agency. To report a crime, a victim or witness need only call or report to the campus police facility and an officer will respond to the location of the incident or take the details of the incident at the police facility.

An official police report will be generated and a copy of the report will be made available to the victim upon request. Each day the incidents from the previous day, excluding names, are summarized and made available to the Langston University Office of Student Affairs and the Office of the President, and the media (Upon Request).

Each month the number of incidents in each category of crime are documented and reported to the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation, who in turn provides the information to the Federal Bureau of Investigation for statistical purposes. These Statistics reflect actual incidents that have been reported to the Langston University Police Department, as well as to other University Officials who have significant responsibilities for the various students and campus activities as defined by the Jeanne Clery Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act.

It must be noted that incidents reported to other University Officials do not always result in a criminal investigation when the victim chooses not to pursue the matter any further with the law enforcement or criminal prosecution process, at which time the victim may seek an alternative Resolution such as the student judicial/disciplinary process via the Office of Student Affairs.

If you are the victim of a crime and do not want to pursue action within the University System or the criminal justice system, you may still want to consider making a confidential report. With your permission, the Chief or a designee of LUPD can file a report on the details of the incident without revealing your identity. The purpose of a confidential report is to comply with your wish to keep the matter confidential, while taking steps to ensure the future safety of yourself and others. With such information, the University can keep an accurate record of the number of incidents involving students, determine where there is a pattern of crime with regard to a particular location, method, or assailant, and alert the campus community to potential danger. Reports filed in this manner are counted and disclosed in the annual crimes statistics for the institution.

CRIMES IN PROGRESS:

To report a crime in progress, a person, victim, or witness, can call 3366 or

Missing Person Report CONFIDENTIAL

The MPR provides a format to collect information in an efficient and coherent manner and is used to support a missing person investigation. If a friend or family member is missing report your findings to the authorities immediately.

Confidential Reporting Procedures

If you are a victim of a crime and do not wish to pursue action within the university or the criminal justice system, you may still want to consider making a confidential report. With your permission, the Chief or a designee of the LUPD can file a report on the details of the incident without revealing your identity. The purpose of a confidential report is to comply with your wish to keep the matter confidential, while taking steps to ensure the future safety of yourself and others. With such information, the University can keep an accurate record of the number of incidents involving students, determine where there is a pattern of crime with regard to a particular location, method, or assailant, and alert the campus community to potential danger. Reports filed in this manner are counted and disclosed in the annual crime statistics for the institution.

Missing Student / Person Notification

Investigation and notification policy regarding students who resides in or on campus housing and have been reported as missing any report to a University official indicating that a student who resides in on campus housing is missing shall be referred immediately to the Langston University Police Department, and an investigation shall be conducted.

If the initial investigation determines that the student is missing the following persons shall be notified.

- 1) A confidential contact person designated by the student, Students have the option of identifying a person of their choice to be contacted in the specific case they are determined missing, Student can choose to identify the same person as their general emergency contact or identify different person who is more likely to know their whereabouts if determined missing (for example a roommate, close friend or an in town relative might be more familiar with your daily movements than an out of town family or friends). The person you designate and their contact information shall be considered confidential and is only to be accessed by University officials after the student has been reported missing.
- 2) The Student's custodial parent(s) or legal guardian(s), if the student is under 18 and not an emancipated minor.
- 3) Local law enforcement authorities. The Langston University Police Department will work with other law enforcement agencies, if necessary, Once a student is determined to be missing, Langston University officials may elect to notify additional persons determined to be appropriate with the Family Education Rights and Privacy Act. 20 ss 1232(g).

IMPROTANT NOTICE

Students are encouraged to share pertinent information with family and friends when leaving campus or taking trips. Sharing this information will enable the University Staff, as well as family and friends to contact you if the need arises.

In addition, students are encouraged to periodically update their emergency contact information.

The following definitions are those used in the Uniform Crime Reporting System of the United States Department of Justice, and the Federal Bureau of Investigation:

Criminal Homicide

The willful (negligent or non-negligent) killing of one human being by another.

Sex Offenses, Forced

Any sex act directed against another person, forcibly and/or against the person's will; or not forcibly or against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent.

A. Forcible Rape: The carnal knowledge of a person, forcibly and/or against that person's will; or not forcibly or against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity (or because his/ her youth).

B. Forcible Sodomy:

Oral or anal sexual intercourse with another person, forcible and/or against the person's will; or not forcibly or against the person will where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her youth or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity.

C. Sexual Assault with Object: The use of an object or instrument to unlawfully penetrate, however slightly, the genital or anal opening of the body of another person forcibly and/or against that person's will; or not forcibly or against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her youth or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity.

D. Forcible Fondling: The touching of the private body parts of another person for the purpose of sexual gratification, forcibly and/or not forcibly or against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her youth or because of his/her temporary or permanent or physical incapacity.

Sexual Offense, Non Forcible

Unlawful, non-forcible sexual intercourse:

A. Incest: Non-forcible sexual intercourse between persons who are related to each other within degrees wherein marriage is prohibited by law.

B. Statutory Rape: Non-forcible sexual intercourse with a person who is under the statutory age of consent (age 16).

Robbery

The taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear.

Aggravated Assault

An unlawful attack of one person by another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault is usually accompanied by the use of a weapon or means likely to sexual orien produce death or great bodily harm. It is not necessary that injury murder, sex result from an aggravated assault when a gun, knife, or other weaporharassment

is used which could and probably would result in serious personal injury if the crime were successfully completed.

Burglary

The unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or theft. For reporting purposes the definition includes; unlawful entry with the intent to commit a larceny or felony; breaking and entering with intent to commit a larceny; housebreaking; safecracking; and all attempts to commit any or the aforementioned

Motor Vehicle Theft

The theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle by someone other than the registered owner.

Larceny

The unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another without use of force or violence. It includes shoplifting, pocket-picking, purse snatching, thefts from motor vehicles, to include parts, and accessories, bicycles, and computer theft.

Liquor Law Violations

The violation of laws or ordinances prohibiting the manufacture, sale, transporting, furnishing possessing or intoxicating liquor; maintaining unlawful drinking places; bootlegging; operating a still; furnishing liquor to a minor or intemperate person; using a vehicle for illegal transportation of liquor, drinking on a train or public conveyance; and all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned. Drunkenness and driving under the influence are not included in this definition.

Drug Abuse Violations

Violations of state and local laws relating to the unlawful possession, sale, use, growing, manufacturing and making narcotic drugs. The relevant substances include; opium or cocaine and their derivatives (morphine, heroine, codeine); marijuana; synthetic narcotics (Demerol, methadone); and dangerous non-narcotic drugs (barbiturates, Benzedrine).

Weapon Law Violations

The violation of laws or ordinances dealing with weapon offenses, regulatory in nature, such as manufacturing sale, or possession of a deadly weapon, or to the matter of minors; and aliens possessing deadly weapons; and all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned. LU Policy prohibits deadly weapons on the University Campus with limited exceptions.

Hate Crimes

Criminal acts intended to injure, threaten, or intimidate a person or persons because of their race, ethnicity, gender, sexual orientation, or religious beliefs. These can include murder, sexual offenses, assault, vandalism, threats, and

FUTURE CRIME FORECAST:

Although we at Langston University believe that our low incidents of crime will continue in the future, this report is not intended to give you a false sense of security. You need to know that crimes will occur, but that prevention efforts can be effective in reducing the opportunities of criminal activity. You play an important role in our crime prevention efforts. Be cautious, careful, and alert to your own safety and protective of your personal property as well as any university property.

SECURITY AND ACCESS CONTROL:

It is the policy of Langston University to lock the doors of buildings which are not in use. However, when working or studying in buildings after normal hours, it is suggested that individual offices be locked, based upon an assumption that unrestricted access to the building is possible.

Some buildings on campus are rarely locked, at the department's request, since student study and work on projects at all hours of the day and night. Individual offices should be locked by user on a presumption that the building is accessible.

Residence halls have open access between the hours of 6 A.M. to midnight, Sunday through Thursday and 6 A.M. to 2 A.M. on Friday and Saturday. During non-open access hours, all residence hall doors are locked. Instances of propped open doors have occurred, and again residents are encouraged to take security precautions in the halls and rooms. Individual rooms should be locked at all times for your safety.

Langston University recognizes that laws and rules are necessary for society to function and supports the enforcement of law by governmental agencies and rules by officials of the University. All persons on the campus are subject to these laws and rules at all times. Local law enforcement officers are welcome to patrol the campus to assist Langston University Police Department in deterring crime. All law enforcement agencies are expected to check in with Langston University Police Department when on campus. Langston University Police Department is recognized by the State of Oklahoma as a law enforcement agency (Oklahoma State Statute 74, Section 1978, Subsection 360.11 et seq.).

Langston University Police Department enjoys an especially good relationship with local law enforcement. All members of Langston University Police Department are police officers with law enforcement and arrest authority on campus.

Langston University relies on the telephone or two-way radio to contact the county emergency dispatch center for fire and emergency medical needs.

Instances where state police resources are needed are determined jointly between the Chief of Police and other Langston University officials. Crimes committed at off campus facilities under the control of Langston University will be disclosed if they come to the attention of LUPD.

CRIME PREVENTION:

Langston University has experienced a great deal of success reducing crime by effectively utilizing crime prevention measures. Some of the more notable efforts are:

- In cases of emergency Dial 3366 or 466-3366 if using a cellular phone
- 24-hour preventive patrols
- Campus foot patrol by uniformed officers
- Burglar alarms in key or highly sensitive areas
- 24-hour on staff Residence Hall staffing
- Blue Light Emergency Telephones strategically located across campus and housing areas
- Academic buildings occupied by custodial staff after hours
- Crime prevention seminars presented to groups
- Crime prevention pamphlets provided to students and staff
- Some parking areas monitored by surveillance cameras
- Crime Stopper telephone line 405-466-3366 or the HOT Line 405-466-2900

In addition to preventing crime, considerable efforts are devoted to crime intervention. All reported crimes are investigated immediately and follow-up investigations are conducted to identify the offenders. When multiple incidents occur, surveillance techniques are implemented to help apprehend the perpetrators. When caught, offenders are dealt with through the county court system and the Langston University disciplinary process when appropriate

Institutions are required to keep a fire log that states the nature of the fire, date, time, and general location of each fire in on-campus student housing facilities Langston University complies with this rule by including all fire-related incidents in the Annual Fire Safety Report and Fire Log Maintained by Environmental Health and Safety,

AVOID VICTIMIZATION:

You are offered these quick tips for personal safety and property security:

- Be cautious of strangers
- Avoid getting into vulnerable no-exit places
- Carry only small amounts of cash
- Do not hesitate to call police when confronted by unknown persons
- Keep your apartment or residence hall room locked at all times
- At night walk in groups or at least in groups of two or more
- Walk with confidence, and avoid walking near bushes and parked cars
- Familiarize yourself with the location of emergency telephones or safe places
- When leaving your car parked, remove all valuables from plain view and lock your vehicle
- Engrave your valuables with your driver's license number and record all serial numbers
- Make copies of credit cards and other valuables in your wallet
- Write your name and ID number in several places in your textbooks
- Lock your bicycle in a bicycle rack

Report all incidents of losses to police immediately

When serious crimes occur on or off-campus that is considered to be a threat to the campus community, such information will be provided to faculty, staff, and students.

The medium for disseminating this information will be the campus newspaper, faculty/staff newsletter, or in special instances, specific notices to the on-campus residences. Such notice may be posted on residence hall entrance doors, bulletin boards, or electronic mediums such as the campus web-site and/or radio and television stations.

ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES AND OTHER ILLEGAL DRUGS:

As set forth in federal, state, and local laws the rules and regulations of Langston University which prohibit the unlawful possession, use or distribution of illicit drugs, and alcohol by students and employees in buildings, facilities, grounds, or other property owned and/or controlled by the University or as part of University activities.

Note: Under Langston University regulations, no 3.2 beer or other alcoholic beverages are "NOT" allowed in Langston University housing or apartments located on Langston University property no matter your age.

Drug and alcohol laws are vigorously enforced on the Langston University campus. Violators are subject to criminal prosecution in the District Court of Logan County. The enforcement techniques can range from plain view violations to long term undercover investigations by local, state, and federal agents and agencies.

The University Counseling Center and Employee Assistance Program offer counseling and rehabilitation programs for students and employees, respectively. Should these programs not meet your needs, there are other programs offered in the community or nearby cities that may better address your needs. A number of such programs are listed in the Langston University Dangerous Drugs and Alcohol Abuse pamphlet.

SEXUAL ASSAULT & Rape

What to Do If You Are Victimized?

The Langston University sexual assault prevention and intervention efforts involve the entire community, which include members of the Langston University

community consisting of representatives from the Langston University Police Department, Division of Student Life i.e. Campus Housing, Counseling Center, Langston University Faculty, Greek Life, Student Health Center. These groups collectively provide training programs, presentations, and workshops to any interested individual or group on the topic of sexual assault.

PROCEDURES TO FOLLOW:

If you become a victim of sexual assault, you should follow certain procedures and consider several options.

These procedures and options are clearly outlined in the rape avoidance seminars mentioned above and the Rape Prevention Pamphlets made available to the Langston University community through the Counseling Center, and the Office of Student Affairs. These outlined techniques and strategies help students recognize and avoid sexual assault threats.

Contact the LUPD:

When you report a sexual assault to the Langston University Police Department or the City of Langston Police Department an officer will be sent to your location. The primary focus of the reporting officer to the scene will be to determine the extent of physical and emotional trauma that you have suffered. If the attack has just occurred moments prior to the officer's arrival to the scene, the officer will want a brief review or some basic details about the events that transpired.

Some the questions, which may be asked by the reporting officer, will include:

- A description of the attacker
- The direction the attacker took when leaving the scene
- A description of the vehicle used by the assailant
- Was the attacker someone that you knew before the attack
- How did the attacker gain access into your apartment or room

Agree to have a Sexual Assault Examination:

An officer or designee will take you to the Stillwater Medical Center, or the Oklahoma Health Science Center to be examined by a physician. You will be given a complete physical examination and treated for any injuries that you may have suffered. If you would like a friend or relative to be with you every effort will be made to accommodate you. In addition you may be examined for the purpose of obtaining evidence, which would be necessary in court during the examination appropriate antibiotic therapy can be given to decrease the chances of developing venereal disease.

After the examination the officer or designee may bring you back to the campus police facility or another location to complete the interview. Again you are encouraged to have a counselor or relative present during the interview. It must be noted that the victim of a rape or sexual assault may not be responsible for legal or medical expenses. Your case will be prosecuted by the District Attorney's Office; you will only have to contribute your time.

Evidence:

Preserving evidence is of paramount importance after a sexual assault has occurred. Victims should be careful not to bathe, douche, wash clothing, or tamper with other potential evidence after a sexual assault. Your first inclination may be to do one or more of the above; however you should resist the temptation. Evidence is critical in a criminal prosecution.

LUPD Investigation:

Later, at the police facility or a designated location, you will be asked to be more specific about the events of the attack. You may have a person of your choosing with you during this period.

Please keep in mind that this line of questioning is done to help the investigation and to help you arrange the events firmly in your mind. Your comments will probably be tape-recorded for future reference. This will make testifying in court much easier and less frightening. The interview will be conducted considerably and courteously only the investigating officer should ask you questions, during the interview.

Based upon the conversation with the officer, you can decide whether to pursue criminal charges or not (threats or harassment of a rape victim after charges have been filed are rare). When finished at the police facility you may go to a place of your choice.

It must be noted that Langston University and City of Langston police officers have been trained to deal with sexual assault victims. However, should you feel uncomfortable speaking to a male officer and would prefer talking to a female, do not hesitate to say so.

Every effort will be made to notify a female interviewer such as a counselor, or female volunteer who will respond.

You may also report a rape or sexual assault to the residence hall director, apartment management, a university counselor, or health worker at the LU infirmary.

It must be noted that you do not have to file charges against an attacker if you report a rape; however it is wise to give the information to the police anyway. The

Information and suspect description you give may help locate a suspect in other offenses and possibly prevent another person from becoming a victim of a rape. Secondly the police will not know that there is a rapist on campus unless you tell them. The police will not pressure you to press charges.

SUPPORT SERVICES: Office of Student Affairs

If you do not want your case to be addressed through the criminal justice system, another alternative is available. Cases involving students who are accused of non-academic misconduct might be assigned to the Office of Student Affairs. Persons found guilty of sexual assault, forcible or non-forcible, could be placed on probation or suspended from Langston University.

Both the accuser and the accused are entitled to the same opportunities to have others present during a campus disciplinary hearing, and both are entitled to be informed of the outcome of any disciplinary proceeding. PARKING SYSTEM

Parking and Traffic Regulations

SUMMARY OF PARKNG SYSTEM

Any motor vehicle parked on University property between the hours of 5:00 A.M. to 5:00 P.M. Monday through Friday, must display a valid LU parking permit or decal. The color and type of permit indicates the area where a vehicle may or may not park during the above dates and time frames.

Please remember the operation and parking of a motor vehicle on University property is a privilege, not a right, and is made available only under the policies established within the Langston University parking and traffic regulations currently in effect.

All vehicles driven or parked on a LU campus by a student or staff/faculty member should be registered with the Langston University Police Department for the current calendar year.

An Oklahoma Driver's license is not required for non-resident students at LU who are at least sixteen years of age and possess a valid license from his or her home state or home country. "International license" (licenses which are not issued from one's country of origin) are not valid in the State of Oklahoma.

Every owner of a motor vehicle registered in the State of Oklahoma must, at all times, maintain liability insurance on such vehicles. In compliance with Oklahoma Statutes, Title 47, Section 7-601.

All Langston University permits and registration decals, regardless of when they are issued, <u>will expire on August 31, of each calendar year</u>. A permit renewal or decal is required for each new academic year for all students, faculty, and staff.

Student parking permits and LU vehicle registration decals are not transferable to another person or vehicle.

Transferred parking permits are transferable only between vehicles that are registered on the parking registration form.

All parking rules and regulations are enforced 24 hours per day, unless otherwise posted.

The Board of Regents for the Oklahoma Agricultural and Mechanical Colleges has determined that reasonable rules and regulations governing the use of automobiles on the campus of Langston University by employees, students, and visitors are necessary and shall be enforced by the Langston University Police Department. Those portions of the rules applicable to employee shall be deemed as part of their employment contract and those portions of the rules applicable to students shall be deemed a part of the regulations that govern students enrolled as LU students.

PHILOSOPHY AND ATTITUDE

Langston University has a philosophy that traffic and parking regulations will be reasonable and expects persons to inform themselves of the parking and traffic rules and regulations and then to comply with them. Appropriate signs will be placed to aid persons in conforming to the traffic and parking rules.

ENFORCEMENT

The LU Police will enforce all traffic laws on campus. Adjudication of traffic tickets and arrests are processed by the Logan County District Attorney and the City of Langston municipal court with judicial review by the District Judge of Logan County. Langston University Police officers enforce parking rules and regulations on campus.

All parking violations may be appealed to the Traffic Appeals Committee; a convening body that meets on the 3rd Thursday of each month between the hours of 2:00 p.m. and 5:00 p.m. or until all appeals have been heard, in L.U.P.D. Public Safety Building, Conference, Room #107.

All parking fines are \$25.00 each with the exception of the fine for parking in a Handicap space which is assessed as a \$100.00 fine. All fines must be paid at the Business Office window between the hours of 9:30 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. Monday through Friday.

PURPOSE: The purposes of these regulations are to expedite the safe and orderly conduct of University business and to provide parking. Facilities in support of that function within the limits of available space.

REMEMBER IF THE SIGN DOES NOT SAY THAT YOU CAN, THEN YOU CANNOT.

Lost and Found

The Langston University Lost and Found is located at the LU Police Department. Additionally, there are Lost and Found areas located in other campus buildings and office. After a certain period of time, all buildings and offices are encouraged to forward any found items to the LU Police Department to maintain a central location for persons seeking lost property.

The LU Police Department will maintain a database of items reporting and cross-checking them with items submitted to lost and found. The identified owners will be notified immediately, and arrangements will be made to return the property. Any unidentifiable or unclaimed property will be held for six months. Bicycles are held for nine months and then disposed of or sold at an annual auction. Inquiries about LOST AND FOUND property can be made at 466-3366.

VISITOR INFORMATION

Visitors should plan to park in the parking areas located immediately south of Page Hall or North of Sanford and Jones Hall. User-friendly signs are located at the entrance of each parking area to provide additional parking information, and identify restricted spaces. LU police officers will also assist with directions and information. Parking services can be contacted at 405-466-3367; police services can be contacted at 466-3368
